




MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Our Circuit Meeting made a decision last Tuesday (September 13th) which may be of long-term significance for the family of churches Methodists call a Circuit. It decided to build on initial work we've done and to move forward to establish a "hub" – name yet not chosen – in the former Spar shop on Victoria Park Road in Fairfield.

It will be a "hub" for activities on the Fairfield Estate and like our church in the Market Place it will sometimes be for activities groups in the community want to arrange and sometimes for groups that the church organises.

We are hoping that other churches may wish to be involved and we hope that we will receive grant aid towards the cost of setting up and running the project. Janet Heys who has been at the heart of thinking about the project will probably be leaving in three years time (August 2014) and will not be replaced. An important part of our planning will be to ensure that when she leaves the project will continue.

The project fits into the pattern of new initiatives being undertaken by the Anglican and Methodist Churches under the title "Fresh Expressions". It's about the way in which the church relates with those for whom the traditional church is "another world", one in which they neither want nor feel able to share.

No doubt you will hear more about this exciting new project in the months to come. For now, I invite you to pray for Janet and for all who will be forwarding this. May they be granted wisdom and perseverance so that the project may come to express the love of God in Christ for all people and be used in his work of change and transformation.

Eva and Elizabeth both lived in Peak Dale until fairly recently and have been great friends for many, many years. Eva was born on 26 April and Elizabeth on 30 May 1911.

Here are just a few of the events in the year of their birth:

31 May	Launching of the ocean liner RMS Titanic in Belfast. Her sister RMS Olympic sails for Liverpool the same day to take up transatlantic service.
22 June	Coronation of King George V and Queen Mary at Westminster Abbey, London. Completion of the Royal Liver Building, Liverpool, is marked by starting the clocks in its towers at the same moment as the Coronation.
July–September	Severe heat wave and associated drought.
9 August	Raunds, Northamptonshire, records a temperature of 98°F (36.7°C), the highest UK temperature until 1990.
10 August	British MPs vote to receive salaries for the first time.
4 October	First electric escalators introduced, at Earl's Court tube station.
21 November	Suffragettes storm Parliament in London. All are arrested and choose prison terms.

Both ladies have been Members of the Luncheon Club since it started in September 2006. Because of ill health, Eva has now moved to Shropshire to live with her daughter but she was well enough to travel in June to join the celebration.

The Luncheon Club continues to provide weekly lunches and activities for the over 70s. This year the staff enjoyed a splendid lunch provided by Peter at the Kwei Lin Restaurant. 

...but for how much longer, unless we encourage a new generation of musicians to discover the thrill of making those pipes speak in tones both deep and sweet?

Thanks to the generosity of past generations, there are many more organs in Buxton's churches than organists to play them - and only one of our local organists is significantly younger than 70.

Spurred on by Kate MacLean, the music sub-group of Churches Together in Buxton has decided to take action. The plan is to 'search diligently' for local musical talent, to identify someone who would welcome the opportunity to take subsidised organ lessons with Buxton's one and only younger organist, Andrew Cummings FRCO.

We have already raised £750 towards the estimated £1,000 needed to fund the scheme for a year, thanks to the generosity of the Bingham and Golsoncott Trusts, and the search for the right candidate is about to begin.

Several supporters have already pledged £25 towards the additional £250 needed. The group is now looking for 5 other sponsors to help bridge the remaining gap.

Some have entertained angels unawares (9 Hebrews 13 v1)

In about 1969 a young boy called Bernard joined Christ Church Pitsmoor where Don was vicar. Bernard lived in inner city Pitsmoor with his mother in a council flat only yards from to the church. He was a regular visitor to the vicarage becoming almost a member of the family.

On one occasion Don took him with the family on a holiday to Oxford. Bernard joined the choir and became for a period the head choir boy. The parish was next to the Cathedral and the choir were invited one Saturday to sing at Evensong and Don was to take the service. The choir of 24 men and boys walked to the Cathedral carefully carrying their freshly washed robes. On arrival they were treated to a feast of tea and cakes prepared by the ladies of the Cathedral congregation before dressing ready for inspection. Canon Dennis McKee was keen to open up the Cathedral to many parish choirs in Sheffield. The choir members were inspected and all was going well until he came to Bernard. The new white trainers which Bernard's mother had bought specially for the occasion were not the correct footwear for a choir boy. Don had to explain that the trainers were the only shoes Bernard had. It was difficult for Cathedral cannon to understand that a mother from the next parish could not afford a pair of black leather shoes.

We lost track of Bernard as the children all went to different secondary schools and it was only a few days ago that we found out what he had achieved after starting his career in the South Yorkshire police. Bernard had been appointed The Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police. The top ranking police officer in the country.

In Don's case the verse should have read "some have entertained a Police Commissioner unawares." We are so proud of Bernard and pray for him in his new post and that his early life in inner city Pitsmoor will help him understand some of the people he will meet in his job.

We have sent him our congratulations and have promised to pray for him

Animal friendly (e.g: free-range eggs from Charis House, milk from contented cows, animal feed that does not harm rain-forests),
Fairtrade (Fair trade helps local farmers cope and poorer people in under-developed countries work their way out of poverty and diversify.)

But LOAF raises some complex issues that we need to address thoughtfully.
